

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

A simple question posed by our council leaders in 2012, "Where is God leading us next?" has led our congregation to this moment. To our Phase 1 capital appeal.

As you may know, this simple question took our congregation on a multi-year quest. Together we sought to discern God's vision for our future ministry through a number of activities. These included listening sessions, user group surveys, discussion forums, architectural rendering reviews, demographic studies, and informal conversations. We offered lots of prayer.

Gradually, consensus formed around these goals:

- To improve hospitality by eliminating physical obstacles to engagement and evangelism
- To enhance young family ministry in response to a growing demand
- To address next steps in ongoing nave restoration
- To support current and new neighbor outreach programs to university students and the community

These broad goals formed the basis for drafting our congregation's new master plan for ministry and facility renewal. Our theme *Building for Belonging* lifts up our desire as a faith community to share and grow in Christ's life together. In 2016, we as a congregation approved the new master plan and authorized Phase 1 of the renovation to begin in May 2017. Turns out, **God's response to a simple question was a bold vision for Luther Memorial!**

This brochure outlines Phase 1 of that bold vision. It provides some history, lists the building improvements, and invites all of us to support the Phase 1 project through a 3-year financial pledge.

Over the coming weeks, please prayerfully consider your response. We invite you to bring your pledge to the *Building for Belonging* appeal on Commitment Sunday, March 26.

No matter what your financial support may be, we ask that you pray for our ministries that we may continue to proclaim in word and deed the crucified and Risen One.

BACKGROUND



In 1905 national church leaders envisioned a new mission in Madison that would use English as the primary language and reach out to students at the University of Wisconsin. By 1907, a dedicated group of 35 Lutheran students were gathering for worship and prayer in homes and other rented space around campus.

Despite this humble beginning and severe challenges spanning decades, **Luther Memorial has endured.** Fires, threats of bankruptcy, a bombing, and cultural shifts within the denomination failed to deter the resiliency and faithfulness of the congregation.

Generations of families and friends made Luther Memorial their home, some for a few years, others for a lifetime. Through their commitment to service, the ministry of this Midwestern congregation has touched the lives of others around the globe.

The faithfulness of all who shaped Luther Memorial's ministry in the past lives on today—through the love of historic liturgy and sacred music; a welcoming spirit to all who enter; commitment to lifelong learning; and a deep call to service.

Congregation founded May 23 as an English language church with UW student outreach

Beyond the campus community, Luther Memorial's urban neighbors battle homelessness, poverty and injustice. The congregation is called to continually learn about, and partner with, valuable programs and services in the community, and become passionate leaders for change.

As the urban environment has naturally shifted, the majority of the congregation's active members now commute from neighborhoods and towns outside the city center. New opportunities for outreach and ministering to families and youth have emerged.

The founding of a congregation is the unimpeachable witness to the world that people have a hunger for the gospel of Jesus Christ and a heartfelt desire for the sacraments of the church.



PHASE 1 RENOVATION



Luther Memorial welcomes thousands of people through its doors every year.

Phase 1 is designed to benefit all who enter and use our space: church members and guests, people of all ages, living nearby and far away, with varying degrees of physical mobility, as well as life-long Christians and those new to faith.

Improvements and renovations will also impact individuals related to certain ministry initiatives:

- · Families with infants and young children
- Worship leaders and communion participants who use the chancel
- Musicians who assist with worship each week from the balcony
- Homeless families we shelter four times each year in partnership with The Road Home of Dane County
- · Students in need
- · Visitors and guests

Phase 1 of the 2016 master plan will focus on major improvements to the 1958 east education wing and the 1921 nave, along with some needed building repair and restoration. Set to begin on May 1, this six-month project is expected to conclude by mid-November 2017.

1958 East Education Wing

Through a complete renovation of the east wing, our goal is to **enhance LM's Sunday School and youth ministry programs** by increasing the visibility, accessibility and function of this space. This project will improve gathering spaces for congregational events, and provide **greater flexibility to house our Road Home guests**. Additionally, the plans include remodeling the second floor to house LM staff.

The basement level in the east wing has been closed off for several years and does not meet current code for occupation. Once this lower space has been renovated we envision using it to **extend LM's outreach to students**, in partnership with the Lutheran Campus Ministry next door.

As part of this project, we plan to add wheelchair accessible bathrooms to the main and second floor and renovate the antiquated and insufficient heating and cooling systems. As we learned in 2012, the roof is in serious need of replacement. And the windows installed in the 1980's are reaching the end of their useful life and are in need of replacement. We will update the fire and security systems, and add an elevator to make all four floors accessible for the first time.

1921 Nave

Goals for nave renovation include installing a new permanent free-standing altar platform to replace the 1988 "temporary" platform, which is not only showing its age but is viewed as unsafe by some of our worship assistants. We intend to restore the wood flooring around the chancel to better preserve it and tend to some serious defects.

Air conditioning will be added mid-nave by replacing the existing heat registers along the outside aisles with new ones that will deliver both heating and cooling as needed. This should help balance the varied temperature levels in the nave when the air conditioning system is running.

In the rear balcony, we will remove asbestos tile, put in new code-compliant railings and provide some additional seating space by enlarging the two lowest choir risers.

We also anticipate **new lighting** and **enhancements to the sound system**, as well as adding air conditioning to the balcony. Lastly we plan to **complete the restoration of the walls** in this area, bringing the entire nave to the color scheme first introduced in the 1996 remodeling.

"How much should I give?"

I love this question. Part of the privilege of working with finances at LM is witnessing the dedication and generosity of our church members.

The giving table (left) is a nice tool for illustrating how your pledged amount distributed over 3 years can add up to a generous sum.

In our household, Kirsten and I calculated it this way. We took the amount we give annually each fall to the ministry (operating) fund, and then multiplied it by 3.

It may help you to understand that our congregation's appeal goal of \$3.7 million over 3 years is roughly equal to 4x Luther Memorial's annual operating budget.

So, whether you multiply your annual gift by 2, 3 or 4, you can see it will make a big difference in helping our congregation reach our \$3.7 million stretch goal.

Basic math—the closer we get to 4x, the less money we will need to borrow to make Phase 1 happen.

<u>FAQ</u>

When does my pledge start?

Phase 1 spans July 1, 2017-June 30, 2020.

What about grants?

Luther Memorial applied for a state preservation grant for historic buildings. By all indications, we expect to receive around \$800,000. (This has been calculated into the total projected building cost of \$4.5 million.)

What about LM's current mortgage?

Because of your faithful and steadfast giving, as well as a recent generous gift, the congregation is currently debt free.

How does this capital appeal pledge affect my/our annual giving?

It doesn't. Your pledge to the *Building for Belonging* capital appeal is above and beyond the support you give for LM's annual (operating) ministry. With your amazing response to the capital appeal and undiminished giving to our annual ministry, the congregation will remain financially healthy and stable.

Can I/we make this gift in honor or in memory of a loved one?

Absolutely. Consider making part, or all, of your *Building for Belonging* pledge a tribute gift—to celebrate, honor, or remember those you love or may wish to recognize. The church will acknowledge these gifts in a lasting way as part of the renovation process. Please indicate your wishes on your pledge form.

They are due by March 26, Commitment Sunday! As a gesture of unity, there is only ONE service planned that morning—at 10:30—followed by a luncheon for everyone. You are invited to bring your *Building for Belonging* pledge forward during communion.



Gather us in...




