



Beloved in Christ,

Sunday evening in the nave. A candle is lighted in the soft darkness. A solitary bell is rung. Time for Evening Prayer with the confirmation students. They take turns each week in leading the service — chanting, reading, singing. Eventually they come to know the liturgy by memory. Early in the service, one of the students will chant the Thanksgiving: Enlighten the darkness by the light of your Christ; may our Word be a lamp to your feet and a light to our path. For me, this is the best part of Evening Prayer.



Confirmation evening prayer is in some way a snapshot of our worship life together. It is inspirational and transformative. It is intergenerational and welcoming. It is the proclamation of Christ crucified and risen from the dead. It is why we gather every Sunday; why we join and why we give and serve.

Your financial gifts and your prayers make it possible for us to continue this ministry, and others like it, for the sake of our life in Christ.

Most years when confirmation is completed, one or more students will ask to help lead Sunday liturgy. That was true this year. This past spring we welcomed Surya Blasiole and Micah Scarlett as new assisting ministers, offering the Sunday prayers of the people, setting the table and distributing Holy Communion.

It is a wonderful thing to see young people participate more fully in the liturgy. But it shouldn't come as a surprise. Liturgy is the work of the people. All the people of God. And at LM we see people of all ages participating in the liturgy and serving as worship leaders. We hear their voices — our voices! — raised in praise and thanksgiving for the one who died and now lives that we might have life and have it in abundance.

Our liturgical practice unites us, nourishes us, and inspires our actions. During this time of fall stewardship, I invite you to prayerfully consider how you will support the life and work of Luther Memorial through all of its avenues of God's light.

FAQ

What does it mean to pledge?

By making a pledge you indicate your desire and intent to help support Luther Memorial financially in the coming year. You choose the amount you wish to give, and how frequently. As Christians we view financial giving as a sacred rite, a practice that deepens our faith. For many, making a pledge creates a structured way to do this.

How is my pledge donation used?

Your giving is vital to the daily work of our congregation. You create opportunities for worship and music, learning for all ages, small group and community enrichment, and outreach programs to serve our neighbors in need. Your pledge to the operating fund also covers regular building maintenance and repairs, and Luther Memorial's support to our synod and other key ministry partners.

How much should I give?

Give an amount that is meaningful to you. Prayerfully consider what is possible for your household at this time. Many in our parish strive to tithe, to give 10% of their income away to charity each year.

How much should I increase my pledge?

How does my pledge impact the Capital Appeal?

It doesn't. Last year, many people pledged to the 3-year capital appeal that runs July 2017–June 2020. This pledge is separate from your pledge to the operating fund. Of course you may wish to increase your capital appeal pledge; you can do this at any time.

Can I pledge to LM electronically?
